

## Privacy notice for PISA 2025

### 1. Why are we collecting this data?

The Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) is an international study which aims to evaluate education systems worldwide by testing the skills and knowledge of students aged 15 or 16. PISA is a worldwide study that has taken place every three or four years since 2000.

The purpose of the study is to produce statistics on students' learning and skills, to gain insights into how best to improve teaching and learning and provide the most effective opportunities for all young people. This is a test of the education system as a whole rather than a test of individual students. The study is split into two sections: a Field Trial that is conducted in spring 2024 and the Main Study that takes place in autumn 2025.

We take privacy and confidentiality very seriously and no individual student, teacher, school or parent will be identified or identifiable in any reporting.

This privacy notice tells you what the Scottish Government (the data controller), and their approved contractor (NFER, the data processor), will do with the information we collect from students and headteachers as part of the PISA study and how we will ensure privacy of personal information. It explains:

- the personal information to be collected for the study
- organisations that information will be shared with
- how we will use the personal data
- what makes it lawful to collect and share the information
- how participation affects you
- security and confidentiality
- contact details and further information

## 2. Who is this study sponsored and funded by?

The National Foundation for Educational Research (NFER) will carry out the PISA Field Study in spring 2024 and Main Study in Scotland during 2025 on behalf of the Scottish Government.

For the purpose of data protection legislation, NFER is the data processor and the Scottish Government is the data controller.

## 3. What is the legal basis for processing activities?

The legal basis for processing personal data is covered by:

- GDPR Article 6 (1) (e)

***Public task:** the processing is necessary for you to perform a task in the public interest or for official functions, and the task or function has a clear basis in law.*

## 4. How will personal data be obtained?

In both sections of the study, data will be obtained directly from students through student assessments and questionnaire surveys. Some data will be provided directly by schools.

NFER will also collect personal information from identified staff in order to facilitate the administration of the study. This data will be collected directly from schools (including their websites) and in rare instances be provided by the Scottish Government.

## 5. What personal data is being collected by this study?

The approved contractors for this study (NFER) will collect the following personal information about participating 15- or 16-year-old students from the local authorities or participating schools in order to administer both the Field Trial and Main Study:

- Name
- Date of Birth
- Gender
- A broad indication of identified additional needs or limited experience of English language (to ascertain whether they may be excused from participation).

The study collects assessment data on students' skills in reading, maths, science and learning in a digital world. It also includes a questionnaire covering students' attitudes to school and learning, and some background characteristics. These include questions about the student's home, parents' education, reading habits, satisfaction with life, feelings and emotions, languages spoken and learned cultural awareness and the school experience. All questions are optional.

In addition to the student data, NFER will also collect personal information from identified staff in order to facilitate the administration of the study. This information will be collected for the Headteacher, nominated ICT contact and nominated staff contact:

- Name
- Job Title

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- Email
- Direct telephone number

**No individual student, teacher or school will be identified or identifiable in any reporting. All reporting of outcomes will be at the national level not at school or student level.**

## **6. Who will the personal data be shared with?**

The list of sampled schools is shared with Scottish Government. We may share staff data with the Scottish Government in order that they can also contact nominated staff for the purposes of administering PISA 2025. For the Main Survey only, the postcode and region of schools is shared with the consortium contractors ACER <https://www.acer.org/au/> and Westat <https://www.westat.com/> so they can quality assure the geographical distribution of sampled schools.

Assessment and questionnaire data is shared with the international consortium contractors following both the Field Trial and Main Survey phases, for the production of the aggregated statistics. However, this will be an anonymised dataset and any information that could identify individual children, teachers or schools will be removed before transfer. The Scottish Government will be provided with a file of participating student candidate numbers and their PISA ID. This will enable them to match this to the anonymised data set in order to enable their analysis.

## **7. Is personal data being transferred outside of the European Economic Area (EEA)?**

No personal data is stored or transferred outside of the EEA. Although the OECD contractors are based outside the EEA only anonymised data is shared with them.

## **8. How long will personal data be retained?**

Personal data is securely deleted by NFER 12 months after submission to the international consortium. This allows for any anomalies or queries to be resolved. This will be the end of May 2025 for the Field Trial and December 2027 for the Main Study.

## **9. Can I stop my personal data being used?**

NFER handles personal data in accordance with the rights given to individuals under data protection legislation. If at any time you wish us to withdraw your data or correct errors in it, please contact [pisascotland@nfer.ac.uk](mailto:pisascotland@nfer.ac.uk)

In certain circumstances, data subjects have the right to restrict or object to processing. They also have the right to make a subject access request to see all the information held about them.
