

School Survey on Inclusion and Belonging (National Survey)

Privacy Notice for School Staff

1 Why are we collecting this data?

The Department for Education (DfE) has commissioned the National Foundation for Educational Research (NFER) to conduct a piece of research exploring current practice to support inclusion and belonging among pupils, including for pupils with SEND. The research aims to understand how widespread these practices currently are in primary and secondary schools in England.

The results will be used to inform government policy and ensure resources are targeted appropriately to achieve the goals of the Government's [Opportunity Mission](#). The Government's Opportunity Mission aims to break the link between a child's background and their future success. One way they hope to achieve this is to help every child to achieve and thrive at school so that they develop the knowledge and skills they need for life. Improving pupils' sense of inclusion and belonging is an important part of how the government aims to help children achieve and thrive.

DfE is the data controller and will make decisions about how and what personal data about school staff is used for the research. NFER will follow DfE's instructions about the personal data is required to undertake its research. You can find DfE's privacy notice [here](#).

This privacy notice covers the national survey. Note - A pilot study was conducted in spring this year to inform the design of and test the feasibility of delivering a national survey about inclusion and belonging. 2 What is the legal basis for processing activities?

To process this personal data, the legal basis for processing this data is:

Article 6 (1) (e): it is necessary to perform a public task (to carry out a public function or exercise powers set out in law, or to perform a specific task in the public interest that is set out in law).

NFER has been instructed by DfE to process this data in order to perform a public task as part of its function as a department of government.

3 How will personal data be obtained?

We will use publicly available contact details to approach schools to participate in the survey. Schools will then be asked to nominate a staff member to participate. Additional personal data will be collected directly from participating schools through online surveys administered using Tivian.

4 What personal data is being collected for this project?

During the recruitment phase, the following personal data will be collected from participating school staff:

- Name
- Email address
- Telephone number
- Job role/title

The survey itself will collect information from school staff about their school's current practice to support pupil inclusion and belonging, as well as any training or CPD delivered in the school on these topics.

5 Who will personal data be shared with?

Tivian, NFER's online survey tool is a data processor for the research. Further information about how Tivian processes personal data is available in their [privacy notice](#).

At the end of the research, NFER will share an anonymous dataset of survey responses to allow for further internal analysis with DfE. All direct and indirect identifiers will be removed from this data to ensure it is fully anonymous and no respondents can be identified from it.

No other personal data will be shared with DfE, unless you agree to be contacted about future research opportunities. If you agree to be contacted about future research opportunities then we will ask you to provide your full name, job title and email address. This information will be shared with DfE at the end of the project (January 2027) and retained for up to one year. It will not be possible for DfE to link this information to your survey responses

6 Is personal data being transferred outside of the UK?

NFER only stores personal data in the UK.

The online survey data collected via Tivian stores survey responses in Azure and AWS data centre infrastructure in the European Union.

7 How long will personal data be retained?

Personal data held by NFER in relation to the surveys will be deleted within six months of publication of the final report. The report is expected to be published in February 2027.

8 Can I stop my personal data being used?

DfE and NFER handle personal data in accordance with the rights given to individuals under data protection legislation. Under certain circumstances data subjects have the right:

- to request access to information that is held about them (a data subject access request).
- to have personal data rectified if it is inaccurate or incomplete.
- to request the deletion or removal of personal data where there is no compelling reason for its continued processing.
- to restrict processing of personal data (for example, permitting its storage but no further processing).
- to object to processing
- to data portability (allows data subjects to obtain and reuse their personal data across different services)
- not to be subject to decisions based purely on automated processing where it produces a legal or similarly significant effect.

Although we value your participation you can stop completing and withdraw from the survey at any time. Unless otherwise instructed, we will use any data and survey responses we have collected up to that point in our analysis. Please note that withdrawing your data will not be possible once analysis has commenced (this will be the day after the closing date of the survey). To exercise any of these rights, please raise your concern with [DfE via this link](#) and quote 'belonging & inclusion survey research' as a reference.

If you want to contact the Data Protection Officer (DPO), please contact [DfE](#) and mark it 'for the attention of the DPO'. They may need to request specific information from you to help them confirm your identity and ensure your right to access the information (or to exercise any of your other rights). This helps ensure that personal information is not disclosed to any person who has no right to receive it.

9 Who can I contact or complain to?

If you have a concern about the way your personal data has been handled, you have the right to complain. We request that you raise your concern with [DfE via this link](#) or us in the first instance. If you raise a concern, then DfE must:

- Acknowledge complaints within **30 days** of receipt.
- Investigate and respond without undue delay.
- Inform you of the outcome of the complaint without undue delay.
